Families and Community members,

Spring is here! We have entered the fourth quarter of the school year! The growth you can see in our students over the three-quarters of any school year amazes me. I am so proud of the students as they model good behavior, work ethic, and kindness. I would be remiss if I didn't take the time to express my gratitude and pride in the Coldwater Exempted Village School District staff. We are blessed to have a staff that is not only great at what they do but also kind, empa-



thetic, and will do whatever they can to help a student academically or socially-emotionally. In my 32-year educational career, I have never been somewhere where, collectively, the staff was as solid as we have in Coldwater. The most special part is we are a true family that cares for one another and has the same vision for our school.

Cav Connection

I feel compelled to address the elephant in the room, our recent levy failure. I would like to share parts of an email I sent to the staff on March 21st:

"Yesterday was a heavy day for many reasons. The sting of Tuesday night's election results took the wind out of my lungs. Like the 5 stages of grief, I know there are stages of acceptance for a superintendent after a levy loss. My current stage is that it was a vote against me as superintendent. Logically, I know it wasn't about me, at least not for most of the voters, but emotionally, that is where my heart is currently. I will get through this stage with grace and begin working harder than ever on what the future looks like for Coldwater Schools.

I will do everything possible to protect and care for you as we move forward. Please know I love each and every one of you, and I do not say that lightly. I know that your career is more than just a way of living; it is your calling in life. I will work with the board of education to balance the need to have monies for the inevitable infrastructure failures that are coming, as well as make sure we have competitive wages to attract and retain employees for when we have the ability to hire, as well as to ensure we do not take advantage of those who serve our students daily.

In the present, I will work with the principals as they build their master schedules and staffing allocations for next year. I have contacted an architectural firm to ask for their advice about our maintenance business plan and the monies that were not allocated to be set aside per the plan's recommendation. I do know that when a firm comes in and does a new analysis, it typically costs anywhere from \$40,000 to \$90,000. I will solicit their recommendations and consult with the board of education on how they want to deal with our infrastructure uncertainty. If the architectural firm recommends that another plan be developed, I will consult with the board on what direction we should take and where those monies would come from in our budget. On the positive side, many in our community are engaged in the happenings in our schools. Please continue to tell our story. Many do not get to see the work you do in and out of the classroom as I get to on a daily basis. They do not get to see the love you give to students, the tears you shed for these students, and the money you spend out of your own pocket for these students. They don't get to see the engaging atmosphere you have in your classrooms. Finally, they don't get to see the spirit and positive culture we have in all our schools. We are not perfect, but we do our best every day and make corrections when we don't get it right the first time. So please take pictures, write up a short description, and either I will get it out on social media or our communication intern, Spencer Etzler, will get it on social media. Also, please reach out to our students' parents on what you are doing in the classroom and engage them more than ever.

I will continue to communicate often with you and the community in the most positive and transparent way possible. In this communication, I will not turn a blind eye to the district's needs. I aim to work with the board of education to ensure our school system has a sustainable future in terms of personnel and infrastructure. My goal is to try to work for 6 more years, long after when I can officially retire, so I can look back in retirement and know that the school is viable for the next 25 years. In doing so, I know that there will be critics of how we move forward. For example, I did receive one data point of feedback on my letter to the parents and community after the election loss that it was threatening. If any of you feel that way, please let me know as soon as possible. The letter aimed to send a positive note that we will be unwavering in what we do every day. At the same time, I have to be honest about what I will advise the board on the best steps forward. I will keep you involved in that process.

In conclusion, stay positive and do what you do best: be relationship-driven and student-focused. I will lead this district with every ounce of energy I have as long as the board and the staff trust in my direction and capability as a leader.

Bottom line, please know I have complete faith and confidence in what you do every day. Also, know that the majority of this community is proud of our school and those who work for our students. I think you saw this in the kind gestures given to the staff in the last couple of days.

I am more proud to be a Cavalier today, and that is because of each of you on this staff. **We are Coldwater, and** we will rise above this, love harder, and be stronger than ever."

Hopefully, you can see that students are still our number one priority within our school. Our teachers and staff will continue to teach, love, and care for all of our students. It is my role to be the educational leader with help from our leadership team, and that will continue to be our priority. It is also my role to ensure the district is ready for next year and 10 to 15 years from now. I will advise the board on our next steps as a district. I feel privileged to have retired superintendents who were once colleagues and are now cherished friends. I seek their counsel and collaborate with them on significant educational matters, some of which are publicly visible, while others remain behind the scenes. In addition, I have the privilege to work with several school leaders internationally whom I am able to share educational issues with to seek advice and share experiences. Finally, I am proud to be the chairman of the board for the Colina Learning Center, a school I helped start in Romania. The board is comprised of experts

from around the world who specialize in many aspects of school. I am fortunate to learn and collaborate with them on school-related matters.

We are now entering the state testing season. I am confident our teachers have prepared our students to do the best of their ability on these state-mandated tests. At our next board meeting, the board will vote on the second reading for the calendars for the 2025-2026 and the 2026-2027 school years. My goal is to approve academic calendars well in advance, typically a couple of years ahead of time. This approach allows families to plan according-ly, being aware of the scheduled school days and breaks, facilitating their ability to schedule family time. Graduation for the class of 2024 will be here before we know it, so I hope the parents of our seniors enjoy the last quarter of their senior year.

I hope everyone enjoys their summer. As a reminder, school activities will be completely shut down from June 29th to July 7th this year. The school and the park have collaborated again to ensure we both shut down the activities we control to allow families to have time together with no outside distractions.

I am delighted to report that we received no findings along with no regulatory compliance findings in this audit. Immunization Requirements for the 2024-2025 School Year

Students entering Kindergarten, 7th and 12th grades are all required to show proof of having all the required immunizations for that grade. Now is the time to schedule your child's appointment to get those required vaccines. **PLEASE NOTE: THE DEADLINE FOR THE 2024-2025 SCHOOL YEAR IS SEPTEMBER 10, 2024.** If proof of the re-



quired vaccinations are not submitted by that date, <u>your child can be excluded from school</u> until the vaccines are received and all paperwork is turned into the student's building office.

Kindergarteners are required to have the 5th Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis, the 4th Polio, the 2nd Measles Mumps Rubella, and the 2nd chickenpox vaccines. Children can receive these vaccines any time after their fourth birthday. They should be up to date with 3 Hepatitis B vaccines.

7th Graders are required to have the Meningococcal A, C, W, and Y vaccine and the Tdap. This Meningococcal vaccine, also known as Menactra or Menveo, has been recommended since 2005. The Tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis, or Tdap, vaccine has been required since the 2010-2011 school year. Pre-teens can receive these vaccines any time after they are 11 years old.

The Meningococcal A, C, W, and Y vaccine is a requirement for **all 12th graders**. This Meningococcal vaccine known as Menactra or Menveo has been recommended since 2005. Many of the students may have had the first vaccine at the time of the required Tdap before 7th grade. If so, the booster dose is now required prior to 12th grade and after 16 years of age. If the vaccine is started after 16, the booster dose will not be able to be given.

Vaccines can be administered at some physician offices, several pharmacies including Schwieterman's, Walmart, and CVS, or at the Health Department. If you wish to have your vaccines at the Mercer County Health Department, please call 419-586-3251 Option 2 for an appointment or to talk to the nurse. If you plan on getting vaccines at a pharmacy, call first to see what paperwork (if any) you have to bring with you.

Spring Ohio Achievement Testing

Our 3rd and 4th grade Cavalier students will soon have the chance to, "prove what they know"!

Spring Ohio Achievement Testing in language arts and math will be during the months of April and May. Following will be the Coldwater Elementary testing schedule:

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April 16 & 173rd & 4th Grade Reading/Language Arts TestApril 30 & May 13rd & 4th Grade Math Test
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Parents are asked to explain to their child that these tests will show how much he/she has learned. Encourage them to try their best, but don't put so much emphasis on the tests that he/she feels stressed. Please have your child get a good night of sleep and a good breakfast with protein (eggs, yogurt, milk) and carbohydrates (fruit, oatmeal, toast) for the days of testing. We want our Cavaliers to perform at their highest achievement ability!

3rd Grade Timelines

Also, our 3rd Grade students just completed a personal timeline project to help them learn about and understand the past, present, and future. This project covers the social studies 3rd grade standard, "Events in local history can be shown on timelines organized by years, decades, and centuries". Having our 3rd grade students complete a personal timeline about themselves, then gives them a connection to understand a timeline, how it works, and how other events in history, such as our local history, can be displayed on a timeline. Students had to have one event for each year of their life (8 or 9). They were to start with their birth and proceed with each year thereafter. Some examples that could be included were birthdays, special vacations, engaging in something (sports, music, or awards), etc.

Students had to write the date and a sentence about the event and why it was special. They could add decorations such as stickers, glitter, ribbons, etc. The timeline could be horizontal, vertical, a book, on the computer/PowerPoint, or anything else they wanted to come up with. In other words, students could be creative! Students also had to give an oral presentation to the class explaining their timeline. Below are some photos of our students' awesome work!





1st Grade Writer's Workshop

Mrs. Moor's class participates in Writers Workshop daily. It is a structured writing program. One of the genres of writing is a "How To" writing style. The students were first taught how to write in this style as a whole group. Then they were able to write their own "How To" on a topic of their choice. The final activity consisted of writing a "How To" on making a pizza. After the writing activity, the students were placed into five groups to create a mock pizza restaurant. They generated a name for their restaurant, designed a pizza menu, and took orders from teachers in the elementary building. They used their order forms from their customers to build each pizza to order. Each pizza came with a vegetable, fruit, mint, and drink. After the pizzas were baked, the students delivered each pizza to their customers complete with a handmade chef hat, mustache, apron, and a smile. The students were also able to make their own pizzas for lunch. Mrs. Moor would like to thank the parents for donating some of the items to make this fun project a success.











Conversations About School / After School Questions

Research shows that supporting your child's education at home is very important to their success. Here are conversation starters that will help you stay involved:

- * Let's see what you brought home. Look at completed work to find out what your youngster is learning and how well they're doing. You could comment on their math work or social studies project, for instance. ("You know a lot about our state's history!") Also respond to notes from their teacher, and sign their weekly envelope or assignment notebook if required.
- * **Show me what you have for homework.** It's your child's job to do their homework, but you play a role, too. Make sure they know what they're supposed to do by having them explain the assignments to you. After they finish their homework, glance over the work to see that it's complete.
- * **Describe a book you enjoyed today.** This gives you an idea of what your youngster prefers to read. Then, build a daily reading habit by asking what they'd like to read tonight. Encourage their reading and listening skills by reading aloud to them and letting them read to you.
- * **Tell me what you learned that you'd like to know more about.** Use their interests as jumping-off points for activities to share. If they like geometry, you might hunt for shapes together. If they're fascinated by how animals adapt to winter, take them to the library to research the subject or to the zoo to see live animals.
- * After-School Questions. Asking "How was school today?" might not get you far. Instead, ask questions like these for a better picture of your child's day:
 - "What's the coolest thing that happened? What wasn't so cool?"
 - "Pretend you're the teacher. How would you describe the day?"
 - "What made you laugh?"
 - "What was the most creative thing you did?"
 - "How did you display the Cavalier Way today? How did others display the Cavalier Way to you?"

Parent Tips for "Little Cav" READING Success

If your child says, "I don't like to read," or you struggle to get them to read, here are some tips for you:

1. Leave Books Around

Put books in the car for your child to read on the road. Stack kids' magazines next to their bed or place a cereal box beside their breakfast bowl to read.

2. Enjoy A Joke

Your child may enjoy riddle, joke, or knock-knock books from the library. Ask your child to read you a few jokes each day. The kids will get a kick out of making friends and family laugh.

3. Search for Fun

Show your child the weekly events calendar in the newspaper. Have them read through the listings to find activities the family could enjoy together.

4. Read Higher Level Books to Them

If your child is interested in a reading series that is at a higher level and they cannot read it independently, read it out loud to them. Kids are never too old to have stories read out loud to them, especially when they are still learning to read and find interest in a topic, series, or book at any level.

5. Special Reading Spot

Create a "special" reading spot in your home or outside that can just be used for reading. If you make reading special, more children will think of it as a privilege and be excited to read on their own or with someone.

6. Picture This

Good readers form mental pictures as they read. To improve and excite your child's urge to read and overall comprehension, read a book without letting he/she see it. Then, ask him/her to guess what the illustrations look like. Examples: How are the characters dressed? Is the setting bright or gloomy?

Thinking Games

Between school, errands, and activities, families spend lots of time on the go. You can use this time for playing "Thinking Games":

1. <u>Would You Rather</u> - Offer two options and ask which they prefer and why. For example, "Would you rather live near the beach or the mountains? Why?"

2. <u>Three Favorites</u> - Someone picks a category and everyone tells their top three choices.

3. <u>What Doesn't Belong</u> - Take turns naming items and asking others to explain which is the odd one out and why. This game is fun as there can be more than one answer. For example ostrich, owl, eagle; (answers: ostrich, because it can't fly or owl, because it hunts at night).

<u>My Father Owns a Grocery Store</u> - One person thinks of a food item and tells everyone what letter it starts with. Everyone else must try to guess what the item is. The game is started by one person saying, "My father owns a grocery store and in it he sells something that starts with the letter ____."

Student Teasing

Sometimes students will begin to tease one another while at school. Here are a few helpful hints for parents on how to handle teasing by another student during recess or after school. First let your son or daughter know that they did the right thing by talking to you. Suggest that they try some of these ideas.

- * Walk away from the other child, for example, by going to another part of the playground.
- * Try staying with another group of friends.
- Look the other child in the eye and say, "Please stop saying that. That is disrespectful and is not The Cavalier Way!"
- * Most importantly, tell your child that he/she should get help immediately from an adult if the child gets physical or uses threatening words.

The seventh-grade team placed 4th at the competition. Individually, seventh-grader Grace Heyne placed 11th, and Alyssa Froning placed 4th overall. Alyssa's story, "The



Growl," written during the second round of writing, was selected as a Best of Round winner.

7th Grade Pre-Algebra Students Design Games of Chance

Seventh grade pre-algebra students are putting their skills to the test in a unique way – by creating their own carnival games! Students are designing games of chance specifically for elementary students.

The project began with the concept of probability. Students explored the idea of experimental probability, which involves playing a game and recording the outcomes to estimate the chance of a certain event happening. They then designed carnival-style games that elementary students would enjoy, incorporating elements of chance like spinning a wheel or tossing bean-bags.

Using creativity and resourcefulness, the students transformed cardboard boxes, colorful paper, and other materials into engaging carnival games. With each game, they carefully considered the probability of winning, making sure it was fair and exciting for younger players.

Students are collecting data from their classmates playing the games, calculating the experimental probability of winning each time. This allows them to compare their initial predictions about the games to the actual results.

They will calculate the theoretical probability of winning each game using formulas and probability concepts they're learning in class to determine the exact chance of winning, based on factors like the number of winning spaces or the size of targets.



The grand finale of this project is a much-anticipated carnival day later in the year. The 7th graders will invite the elementary students over to play the games they designed.



7th Grade Pre-Algebra Students Participate in a Walk-a-thon

Students in 7th grade pre-algebra recently participated in a walk-a-thon to benefit a cause they care about. Students researched non-profit organizations and voted, as a class, which organization they'd want to donate to. Students are using their data in our algebra unit to make estimations and solve and graph algebraic equations. They are learning to recognize linear functions by the constant rate of change between two variables in a table, graph, and equation. They are solving linear equations and writing equations for lines with their walk-a-thon data which gives them real, authentic data to work with.



Besides getting really good, authentic data, students were able to participate in making a significant donation to Make-A-Wish Foundation and the Mercer County Cancer Association - donating over \$2200 combined! This is something our students, as well as those who contributed to the walk-a-thon can feel good about! It's not everyday that 7th grade students get to be a part of something so amazing! They really showed enthusiasm in raising as much money as they could for these organizations, and they are certainly proud of our donation!
