Dear Parents, Families, and the Coldwater Community,

As we progress into 2025, we are reminded of the resilience, spirit, and unity that define our Coldwater community. This year, however, brings critical challenges and decisions that will shape the future of our schools. I am writing to provide a transparent update on these issues and how they impact our district.

Fair School Funding Plan: A Promise in Question

Our financial planning has been guided by the phased implementation of the Fair School Funding Plan (FSFP), a long-standing promise by state legislators to fully fund public schools. Unfortu-

nately, recent statements from state leaders, including Ohio Speaker of the House Matt Huffman, cast doubt on this commitment. His proposal to cut \$650 million from public schools undermines the very foundation of equitable education funding. While private schools have received over \$1 billion in voucher funding, public schools like ours are being asked to do more with less.

At the recent board meeting, we presented multiple scenarios to outline the potential impact:

- A fully funded FSFP.
- A FSFP without full funding.
- The implications of passing or not passing the proposed levy on these scenarios.

Levy Decisions and Financial Sustainability

Last year, the community defeated two levies designed to stabilize our finances. These measures would have helped address budget deficits and maintain current programs and staffing levels. Despite these setbacks, we remain committed to fiscal transparency and are working hard to navigate this uncertain landscape.

The Board of Education recently voted to place a 0.5% traditional income tax levy on the May ballot, contingent on the FSFP being fully funded. If the state does not honor its commitment, we will need to reevaluate and may instead propose a combination levy in November to offset potential funding shortfalls. Our financial data in the board statement highlights the stakes:

- Per-Pupil Revenue: Coldwater ranks near the bottom among regional districts in funding.
- **Efficiency:** Despite these constraints, we maintain one of the highest student-to-administrator ratios in the region and direct a significant portion of our budget toward instruction.

Advocacy and Action

We are actively advocating for full FSFP funding, urging lawmakers to prioritize public education. On January 31st, Representative Susan Manchester visited our school to discuss these critical issues. This meeting was an important opportunity to highlight the importance of sustained investment in Coldwater schools and the broader public education system.

It is more important than ever that our legislators hear from constituents about the absolute need to fully fund the FSFP. Your voices and advocacy make a difference, and I encourage you to stay informed and engaged.

The Path Forward

Our community's strength lies in its collaboration and commitment to our students. As we navigate these challenges, we will continue to communicate transparently. Together, we can ensure every community member is equipped to make informed decisions.

On January 14, 2025, the Board conducted their annual organizational meeting. The organizational meeting is required by the Ohio Revised Code to be held within the first fifteen days of January of each year, and shall organize to elect a president and vice president for a one-year term. Therefore, the board elected Jim Miller as President and Mike Hoying as Vice President. Additionally, the following regular board meetings will be held on the second Tuesday of the month, with the exception of April, June and July. All meetings will be held in the Cav Room, beginning at 6:00 p.m. for the 2025 year:



Financial Update

We have received the tax year 2024 rates and amounts from the Mercer County Auditor, showing a valuation increase of less than one percent. A triennial update is scheduled for tax year 2026, with collections beginning in 2027. This update has been factored into the forecast.

Governor DeWine will soon create and implement the next biennial budget, set to begin on July 1. A key topic of discussion will be the Fair School Funding Plan, as the legislature previously committed to the third phase and full funding of the formula in this budget cycle. However, this commitment is now uncertain, as House Speaker Matt Huffman has stated there is no third phase to the formula.

If the funding plan remains as is without full funding, Coldwater Schools will begin deficit spending in FY26, which begins this July. This will result in our district being placed under Fiscal Caution by the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce in the coming year and entering Fiscal Watch by FY28, with cash reserves depleted by the end of FY29 (see graph below). If the funding plan is fully funded, our forecast indicates deficit spending would begin in FY27, still indicating the need for additional revenues.



The Ohio Department of Education and Workforce has released the FY24 Cupp Report. The chart below compares our local property tax and income tax revenue with other local schools. For instance, we receive \$5,225.02 in property/income tax dollars per student by 1,400 students, totaling \$7,315,028, whereas Celina would receive \$13,713,672 for the same number of students. Our property/income tax revenue per student is the lowest in the region.

iSee Program

We are happy to announce that on March 7, 2025, Coldwater Schools will be part of the iSee Program. This program will provide free eye exams and glasses if needed for students in grades K-12 who meet certain qualifications. A volunteer eye doctor will be at Coldwater Schools to perform the exams and then return within 2-3 weeks following the exams to dispense any glasses prescribed.



Who Can Participate?

Students who are not currently under the care of a provider (not having had an eye exam in the previous 12-months) are eligible to participate in an iSee clinic if:

- The student was referred for a vision exam after a school eye screening.
- The student has recently been placed on an Individualized Education Plan (IEP).
- A parent, guardian, or school staff thinks the student might have a vision problem.

We will give priority to students who also meet these conditions:

- Students from families with limited financial resources.
- Students who don't have insurance or have limited vision insurance.
- Students who are covered by Medicaid can also participate in the program.

The goal of this program is to help students get the eye care they need to do well in school and socially, no matter their financial situation.

How to Apply: If you think your child might qualify for the iSee Program, please contact the School Nurse to start the referral process. We encourage families and school staff to reach out if they think a student might have a vision issue. Early detection is important for a student's success.

The birth day was a whirlwind. Confident they would be discharged, Abby worked until 10 am and casually proceeded to get ready. They arrived at Miami Valley Hospital around 1 pm, where the process moved quickly.

The girls arrived in quick succession:

- Adelaide (oldest): Born at 3:58 pm, described as opinionated, sweet, and vocal a mini version of Abby.
- Charlotte: Born at 3:59 pm, quiet with big eyes, considered Kevin's mini-me according to family and friends.

At three months old, the quadruplets are meeting developmental milestones. They can:

- Fixate on objects, particularly enjoying Christmas lights
- Provide animated facial expressions
- Imitate their parents
- Demonstrate impressive head and neck control

Their pediatrician is delighted with their progress. Three girls now weigh over 7 pounds, with Eden, the smallest, at 6 pounds 5 ounces.




experience the joy of giving while also practicing essential real-life skills like budg-

Overall, the assembly was a huge success—an exciting and uplifting way to celebrate our students and keep the momentum going as we move into the rest of the year! Go Cavaliers!





School Safety/Winter Safety

Here is another friendly reminder of some safety tips to reinforce with your child at home to help them stay safe when walking, riding a bike, or getting dropped off/ picked up at school.

Walking/Biking

- Walk/Ride with a friend when possible.
- Ask your parents to help you pick a safe route to school; one that avoids dangers.
- Stick to the route you picked with your parents. Don't let friends talk you into shortcuts that are more dangerous
- When you are near the street, don't push, shove, or chase each other.
- Always use the crosswalk.
- Pay attention to cars and always be looking out for vehicles. Don't expect them to notice or stop for you as you always need to make sure there are no cars coming when crossing a street or intersection.

Dropped Off/Picked Up

- Enter through the assigned door before 8:00 a.m. After 8:00 a.m. enter at the most convenient door from Circle Drive.
- Parents when dropping your child off at the beginning of the day, please use the Circle Drive drop off line, or park in the visitors lot and walk your child across the crosswalk.
- DO NOT use the staff parking lot as a drop off/pick up area for your child. Please park in the visitors parking lot to drop off/pick up your child at the beginning and end of the day if you do not wish to use the Circle Drive drop off line.
- While waiting to get picked up at the end of the day, please listen for your car number or name and slowly walk to exit out of the building to Circle Drive.

- Stay beside Mr. Etzler until he or a staff member tells you what cone to stand by. Then WALK to your car after it has stopped.
- Always enter/exit the vehicle on the curbside.
- Parents are asked not to use their cell phones as their children are in the drop off zone for safety purposes.
- Please be very careful pulling out of the pick up line. SLOW DOWN...everyone's safety is at risk!
- As a reminder, please talk with your children about winter safety when traveling to and from school and to wear proper clothing for those cold days. Please note the guidelines we will follow for inclement weather for recess.
 - ⇒ 20 degrees or lower: Students stay inside
- ⇒ 21-32 degrees: Students can be inside, outside, or combined depending on wind chill and precipitation
 - ⇒ 33 degrees or higher: Students outside unless precipitation
- ♦ PLEASE REMEMBER TO DRIVE SLOWLY THROUGH THE SCHOOL ZONE, DROP OFF/PICK UP ZONE AND THROUGH THE ELEMENTARY PARK-ING LOT. PAY ATTENTION TO PEDESTRIANS AND CARS PULLING OUT OF SPACES. You as a driver have a big responsibility in keeping our students safe. Thank you!

Kindergarten Screening and Registration

Coldwater's Kindergarten Screening will be held on Thursday, March 20 and Friday, March 21 in the elementary library center and kindergarten classrooms. At the time of the screening, parents will **NEED** to bring a birth certificate, immunization records, and custody papers (if applicable). We look forward to this time we get to spend with you and your child.

Mercer County Educational Service Center Early Identification Child Find

If you have concerns for your 3, 4, or 5 year old child about their speech or any potential developmental delay, the Mercer County ESC is here to help! The Child Find will be held at the Mercer County Educational Service Center on these dates: February 21 and March 21, 2025, from 8:00 a.m. -12:00 p.m. This screening is not a requirement in order to enroll in preschool but can be used to help identify any potential learning needs. The free screening will cover:

- Articulation/Language
- Fine Motor/Gross Motor
- Hearing/Vision
- General Knowledge/Pre-Academics

Students who frequently attend school feel more connected to their community and develop strong social skills and friendships, which are important life skills.

The power of "YET"...Help your Cavalier have a GROWTH MINDSET

"5 Easy Ways to Encourage a Growth Mindset in Your Child" from: EDUCATION, PARENTING on 04/10/15

- 1. Lead by Example: Many of us have a fixed mindset about something in our life, and it is important for us as parents to challenge ourselves as much as we seek to challenge our kids. If they see us tackle our own problems as a challenge to be solved, they'll learn to do the same. Conversely if they see us lash out and blame others for our own failures, they will learn to think that they are not in control of their destiny and that life is nothing more than the roll of the dice.
- 2. Call off the rescue mission!: As parents, all we want to do is protect our children from life's hurts and disappointments. Unfortunately, when we constantly bail them out of difficult situations caused by their own poor choices, they never gain the opportunity to develop their own coping strategies to manage setbacks.
- 3. Failure is a good thing! : Without a sense of failure, we would never be motivated to learn anything new. If everything came easy to us, life would be incredibly boring. We can all remember a time in our life where we worked really hard on something and it paid off. Few of us can recall the time we got an A on an assignment that came easy to us. This is because the reward is actually in the hard work (and the struggle). Children need to learn that it's okay to make a mistake. In fact, it's a necessary part of the learning process.
- 4. Change your vocabulary: Henry Ford once said, "Whether you think you can or you think you can't, either way you're right!" Instead of "I can't..." "I'm bored..." "I give up..." it's important to teach children to approach difficult tasks with "I can..." "What am I missing?" "What strategies have I learned before that could help me now?" The words we choose are a powerful indicator of the type of mindset we carry with us through life.
- 5. The Power of Yet: Instead of dwelling on their shortcomings, children need to learn to identify the next steps to greater achievement. It's not that they don't understand something...it's that they don't understand something <u>yet!</u> Next time your child comes home with a bad grade, instead of focusing on all the things that went wrong, focus your energy on the next steps they can take to improve their skills. Do they need to study more? Develop strategies to cope with test anxiety? Put in more effort? Whatever it is, teach them to learn from their mistakes and move on. The learning that comes as a result of the grade is much more valuable than the grade itself.



Kindergarten Readiness: What does it look like? - "Is My Child Ready for Kindergarten?"

To prepare for kindergarten, our Little Cavaliers need to be supported and nurtured in all areas of development. It is also important that your Little Cav is physically, socially and emotionally ready to participate in school. Our team of teachers are very well trained and prepared to help your child be their best academically. If your child is kindergarten ready, our team will make sure your child gets the academic instruction needed for them to be their best self. The following list can serve as a guide as you and your child prepare for the exciting transition to kindergarten at Coldwater Elementary!

Can your child...

- Separate from primary caregiver without anxiety?
- Use self-control?
 - ⇒ Keeping hands to self
 - ⇒ Sharing and taking turns
 - ⇒ Cooperating and playing with other children
 - ⇒ Using classroom supplies appropriately

Cooperate with adults and authority figures?

- ⇒ Following directions
- ⇒ Communicating needs effectively

Demonstrate self-help skills?

- ⇒ Using the restroom independently
- ⇒ Putting on and zipping your own coat.
- \Rightarrow Tying shoes.

Use classroom tools and toys efficiently?

- ⇒ Cutting with scissors
- ⇒ Holding and using a pencil, crayon or marker
- ⇒ Building with blocks or Legos

Express self-awareness in a variety of ways?

- ⇒ Knowing first and last name.
- ⇒ Writing first name.
- ⇒ Naming the letters in the first name.
- ⇒ Knowing the name of the primary caregiver(s).

Please remember, young children develop and change constantly. Help your Little Cav make successful transitions from home to school. If he or she cannot do something this week, you may see them do it a couple of weeks later. Providing opportunities to practice these skills through daily routine and experiences will help foster your child's independence and love of learning.

Early Literacy Tips for Preschoolers

At Home

- TALKING As you are preparing a meal, invite your child to help. Talk about what you are doing, how you are doing it or the food you are preparing (name, color, texture, taste, or where it comes from).
- SINGING Singing is a great way to learn new vocabulary and help children understand sentence structure by slowing language down. Try to sing songs about everyday routines such as getting dressed, washing hands, or making breakfast.
- READING Encourage your child to choose books he/she is interested in, even if you feel that the story is too long for their attention span or bedtime. Try going on a "picture walk" through the story where you discuss what you see going on in the illustrations; you can even make up your own story about what is happening in the pictures you see.
- WRITING When coloring or scribbling, encourage your child to write as much as he/she can about what they are drawing. This will help him understand that written words stand for spoken language.
- PLAYING Dress-up is a fun and inexpensive way to introduce your child to storytelling. Provide them with old clothes and other household props to help them act out favorite stories or make up their own! Encourage them to think about how a story progresses through the beginning, middle, and end.

On the Go

- ⇒ TALKING Engage your child in conversation while in the car. Talk about where you are headed, what you did last time you were there if it's a familiar place, or what new and exciting things you will do if it's somewhere your child has never been.
- ⇒ SINGING Keep a CD or a playlist of your child's favorite songs in the car. Sing along with them (or sing made-up songs!) to help your child hear syllables, word sounds and new vocabulary.
- ⇒ READING Words are all around us! Point out letters or simple words that your child may recognize, such as ones that start with the same letter as his name or easy rhyming words.
- ⇒ WRITING While waiting in line or at the doctor's office, do a simple finger play or rhyme that gets their hands



- moving, like "Itsy, Bitsy Spider" or "Open Them, Shut Them". Moving and stretching their fingers will help them build the fine motor skills they'll need to write and draw.
- ⇒ PLAYING Play a game of "I Spy" while in the car. Take this opportunity to work on building your child's vocabulary by picking things they may be unfamiliar with or by using very descriptive language to help them guess the item you see.

5 Parent Tips for "Little Cav" READING Success

1. Read Regularly

Try to read to your child every day. You might aim for 10-15 minutes of bedtime reading for a peaceful end to the day. Bring along a book, and read to your child during a sibling's sports practice. Or curl up together with a book when you get home from work.

2. Take Turns Choosing Books

Your child may want to hear old favorites again and again. Use your turn for new titles and variety (nonfiction, poetry).

3. Let Them Participate

Ask your child to turn the pages while you read. Also, they can finish sentences that rhyme or fill in the words they know. Go slowly so they have time to understand the story and look at the illustrations. They'll enjoy read-aloud time more if they play an active role.

4. Be Playful

You can use different voices for different characters (a high, squeaky voice for a mouse or a deep, booming voice for a horse). Or substitute your youngster's name for the main character's name, and use family members' names for other characters. Note: You don't have to be an expert reader - your child will love it when you read aloud because it's you.

5. Boost Their Vocabulary

A large vocabulary can turn your child into a better reader and writer. Try these everyday ways to help them learn new words:

Keep your ears open: When you and your youngster go places, point out words that people use. Maybe a waiter describes an entree or the dentist talks about molars. Encourage your child to figure out what they mean by the way they're used.


Go beyond nouns: Help your youngster add verbs and adjectives to their vocabulary. Sports and games offer opportunities to use action words. Let your child hear you comment on the softball that soars or the runner who sprints. When they write or send thank you notes or greeting cards, suggest descriptive words (a polka-dot shirt, a fantastic birthday).



I hope this message finds you well and that your year is off to a wonderful start. It's hard to believe we're already halfway through the 2024–2025 school year! The second semester began on January 21st, and by now, students are fully immersed in their third nine weeks of learning. As we embark on this next chapter, our focus naturally shifts toward preparing for state testing. While these assessments are significant, we're careful not to lose sight of our greater mission: nurturing well-rounded, character-driven students who will grow into outstanding citizens of our community, state, and nation. With the incredible families, students, and staff that make up the Coldwater School community, I'm confident we'll excel in both academics and character develop-

ment.

At Coldwater Middle School, our daily mission is to cultivate excellence in one another through everything we do and everyone we meet. Of course, some days are more challenging than others. Maybe the weather isn't cooperating, you didn't get enough sleep, you're fighting off a cold, or you're navigating a tough season in life. We've all been there—feeling short on patience and in need of some space. But during those times, there's always someone who helps us keep moving forward with a bit of advice or encouragement. For a child, that person is often a parent.


Those notes contained advice, reflections, and wisdom that shaped me profoundly. Though I wish I had kept every single one, I find myself drawing from their lessons as I raise my own children, hoping to leave a similar impact.

Even now, my dad continues to share his wisdom, though the format has evolved with technology. These days, his notes often come as texts. One in particular that stands out in my mind was sent to me via text with a link entitled, "A Simple Formula for Living." He wrote,, "Still being a dad with my advice. Share with my grandkids." and it goes like this. "Live beneath your means. Return everything you borrow. Stop blaming other people. Admit it when you make a mistake. Give clothes not worn to charity. Do something nice and try not to get caught. Listen more; talk less. Everyday, take a 30 minute walk. Strive for excellence, not perfection. Be on time. Don't make excuses. Don't argue. Get organized. Be kind to unkind people. Let someone cut ahead of you in line. Take time to be alone. Cultivate good manners. Be humble. Realize and accept that life isn't fair. Know when to keep your mouth shut. Go an entire day without criticizing anyone. Learn from the past. Plan for the future. Live in the present. Don't sweat the small stuff. It's all small stuff."

These simple truths resonate no matter your age. They remind us of the lasting influence we can have on those around us. Adolescence and young adulthood are among the most formative—and often most challenging—times in a child's life. While they might not always seem receptive to what we say, a written note can speak volumes. Consider leaving a thoughtful message on your child's nightstand. The 6th Grade Box Project

As part of the sixth-grade math curriculum, students need to understand surface area and create 3D nets. What better way to learn than by creating real-world projects?

In December, 6th grade students got to work creating fleece blankets to give to special recipients. Students then had to create a box using a 3D net to put the blanket in. The blanket needed to fit in the box perfectly. After creating the box, students decorated the outside in a way that was meaningful to their recipient.



10th Annual Ohio High School Ethics Bowl

On Saturday, January 18th, Coldwater High School competed in the 10th Annual Ohio High School Ethics Bowl. This year's competition was held at the University of Findlay's College of Business. Ethics Bowl competitions have occurred at the collegiate level all over the country for almost 30 years but starting in 2011 competitions were extended to high school students. This was the 10th and the only event in Ohio involving the discussion of ethics. Twelve teams from six high schools competed in the 6-hour long event. Teams competed in dual events over the importance of ethics in our society. Two Coldwater teams competed in six dual events against Findlay, Hilliard Darby, Hilliard Bradley, Hilliard Davidson, Shadyside Academy (Pittsburgh, PA). Each match lasted for 35 minutes and required calculated deliberation, eloquent speech, and thoughtful responses from rigorous questioning. Teams were awarded points (based on presentation, cordialness and rational ideology) from three judges. By the end of the day, Coldwater had two wins against Hillard Bradley Team 2 and Findlay Team 3 and one tie but losses to Hilliard Darby 1, Hillard Davidson and a close loss to Shadyside Academy. We are excited to compete in the State Ethics Bowl next year. Coldwater is the only school to compete in this event in all 10 years.

With our current scoreboards, we can no longer purchase controllers. The one scoreboard actually goes out from time to time, but if we blow the horn, it will turn back on. This is a sign that new ones are needed for the next 25+ years. We will also be putting another "band aid" on the track. We will repaint it this spring and fill in some more cracks. We are "hoping" to get another 2 years out of it. Tracks should last 15-20 years and our track is now approach year 30.


I would like to Thank all of my workers that help me get through the year. People often don't understand that without ticket takers, ticket sellers, scoreboard workers, officials, custodial, timers, announcers, managers, bus drivers, etc. we wouldn't even have events for these student/athletes to participate in. This goes for all levels as well. It is a thankless job but without them, we don't have athletics. People don't put two and two together, but if you think of all of the events we have all year long at all levels, it takes hundreds of workers to get these events accomplished for our kids. If you get a chance sometime when attending a game, just take a quick second to Thank one of the workers for running that scoreboard, keeping time, selling those tickets, etc. Doesn't take much but they would truly appreciate it and deserve it.

Hudl live streaming updates. I am working on several new things for Hudl live streaming. One, we added a camera at the baseball field at diamond 3. We are working on Softball yet, but they do not have internet available there at this point. Keep in mind, that although Hudl has been around for coaches for years, this is their first year of live streaming. We are aware that their phone and computer streaming apps work well, but their tv app is simply awful right now. I have another meeting with their corporate people in April and this will be one of the topics. We are also working on developing a league usage policy so that you can view any game in the league. At this point, you are permitted to view any game Coldwater plays in with your yearly purchase, but we are working on so you can view other league games that Coldwater does not play in. Also keep in mind, All league schools now use Hudl but some non-league do not. If they do not, you obviously cannot view games from their site as they don't have cameras. Thank You to Lefeld Welding and Upper Deck Sports for sponsoring Hudl. Year one has been pretty good with the switch, but year two should be even better!


