As the holiday season approaches, we have an opportunity to reflect on the shared values that make Coldwater so special—family, hard work, and kindness. The loss of one full year of collections adds strain to our budget, but we are committed to moving forward thoughtfully. The Board of Education, with advice from the Business Advisory Committee, is exploring all options, including the possibility of placing the levy back on the ballot in May.

We are asking those who supported the levy in November to continue to champion the importance of this measure. If it returns to the ballot, your vocal advocacy will be critical in helping others understand the value of supporting our schools. At the same time, we are preparing for all scenarios and will evaluate ways to ensure sustainability while prioritizing our students' needs.

Additionally, I want to remind families of our school policy, instituted in 2022, which ensures no homework or schoolwork will be assigned over the holiday break. From December 23rd through January 3rd, students and families can focus on enjoying quality time together, free from the stress of schoolwork. I encourage you to use this time to reconnect, recharge, and create lasting memories.

As we celebrate the holidays, let's take pride in all that makes Coldwater an extraordinary place to live and learn. Thank you for your continued support of our students, staff, and schools. Together, we will continue to build a bright future for our community. Please don't hesitate to reach out if you have questions, concerns, or ideas to share.

FROM THE DESK OF THE TREASURER, JENN MCCOY:

Financial Update

The Board of Education approved Coldwater Schools Five Year Forecast during the November board meeting. O.R.C. 5705.391 and O.A.C. 3301-92-04 require a Board of Education to submit a five-year projection of operational revenues and expenditures along with assumptions to the Ohio Department of Education prior to November 30th

and an update by May 31st of each fiscal year. A financial forecast is somewhat like a painting of the future based upon a snapshot of today. The five-year forecast encourages district management teams to examine future years' projections and identify when challenges will arise. You can view the forecast and notes on the Ohio Department of Education website. Please contact me if you have any questions regarding the district's finances or five-year forecast as there are many assumptions that go into it.

We anticipate maintaining a positive cash flow in FY25 and FY26, but deficit spending is projected to begin in FY27, which will start depleting our cash reserves. By FY29, balancing the budget will require either a 3.32% increase in revenue or expenditure reductions totaling \$653,594. Below are key notes and assumptions reflected in this forecast:

- **Property Valuations:** Mercer County's triennial update in tax year 2026 is expected to increase property tax revenue beginning in FY27.
- School Funding Phase-In: The forecast assumes that the final two years of the six-year school funding phase-in will be approved by legislators, including updates to base cost inputs in FY26, as communicated by our local legislator. If this approval is not included in Governor DeWine's next budget, deficit spending could begin as early as FY26.
- **Expiring Levies:** The Emergency Levy will expire in tax year 2026, leading to reduced property tax revenue in FY28 and FY29. Additionally, the Bond Maintenance Levy (Classroom Facilities) expires in tax year 2024, necessitating that related expenses be covered by the general fund.
- **Transfers for Long-Term Needs:** The forecast includes planned transfers to a capital fund for critical infrastructure updates and replacements, as well as to the severance fund to address retirement-related costs.
- **Staffing Projections:** Increased middle school staffing is anticipated in future years to accommodate the large elementary class sizes transitioning into middle school.
- **Student Fees:** Revenue from increased student fees has been incorporated into the classroom supply budget, helping to delay the onset of deficit spending.
- **Capital Expenditures:** The forecast includes the purchase of one new bus in FY26, funded by the general fund, as the Permanent Improvement Fund lacks sufficient resources for such purchases.

<u>Grants</u>

Coldwater EVSD has received a Staff Wellness Grant in the amount **\$5,350** which will be used towards mental health and wellness within the buildings.




Mercer Co. Board of DD Presentation






Coldwater Elementary Thanksgiving & Holiday FUN!

Excellent Attendance

Being in school every day means your child won't miss out on learning. Try to schedule appointments and family trips outside of school hours if possible. If your child asks to stay home "just because", remind him of what he'll miss, such as reading/math groups or gym class. Explain that school is a privilege, priority, and it is very important to not miss out on anything.

Safety: Traveling To and From School

Students getting to and from school safely is very important. Here are some safety tips to reinforce with your child at home to help them stay safe when walking, riding a bike, or getting dropped off/picked up at school.

Walking/Biking

- Walk/Ride with a friend when possible.
- Ask your parents to help you pick a safe route to school; one that avoids dangers.



- Stick to the route you picked with your parents. Don't let friends talk you into shortcuts that are more dangerous.
- When you are near the street, don't push, shove, or chase each other.
- Always use the crosswalk.
- Pay attention to cars and always be looking out for vehicles. Don't expect them to notice or stop for you as you always need to make sure there are no cars coming when crossing a street or intersection.

Dropped Off/Picked Up

- In Circle Drive, if you arrive before 8:00 a.m. please wait by and enter through the grade level assigned door. After 8:00 a.m. you may enter through any Circle Drive door that is most convenient for you.
- While waiting to get picked up at the end of the day, listen when your number is called, stand behind the color cone that you have been told to wait by, keep hands/feet to yourself, and wait patiently for your car to pull up to the cone.
- Wait until your car is completely stopped before walking to get into it.
- Always enter/exit the vehicle on the curbside.

PARENT Reminder: Drop Off / Pick Up

- Please cross Vine St. at the crosswalks only. We expect our students to do this to be safe. Set a good example and be a good model.
- Drive slowly through the Circle Drive drop off/pick up line.
 Please drive <u>SLOWLY</u> through the parking lot. Remember this is a parking lot and not a street.
- Please pay attention to the staff directing the drop off/pick up line so that it runs smoothly.
- Be courteous and conscientious of your surroundings. <u>Drive</u> <u>respectfully...little eyes are watching!</u>



5 Parent Tips for "Little Cav" Success

1. Stick to a Routine

Children benefit from having a consistent bedtime and wake time each day. Taking time to have breakfast in the morning is very important to get the day started. If your children spend a lot of time deciding what to wear and in preparing their backpack in the morning, add these activities to their nighttime routine to have a smooth start to the day. Having a consistent homework time each day is an important component in building study skills.

2. Support Homework Independence

Once students are able to read the directions on their homework, they should complete their assignments by themselves. Students may ask for help because they enjoy the parental attention, but this can lead to asking for help when they don't need it. When children do their homework without a reminder and on their own, this is a good time to acknowledge their independence.

3. Think Long-Term

Children who have a long-term goal often have increased motivation in school. Setting a long-term goal with your child can help connect the relevancy of your child's daily activities with the future. It is never too early to think about developing time management skills. Using time wisely by completing homework and chores quickly enables children to have more time for fun activities.

4. Have a Positive Learning Attitude

Attitudes are infectious and an integral component to having success. Parents who have a positive attitude towards learning and school can excite children with their enthusiasm. On the other hand, their mindset may be affected by parents who are upset with the teacher or school. Showing interest in your children's studies by asking questions can foster motivation and a positive learning attitude.

5. Connect with the Teacher

Building a relationship with your child's teacher can help you understand how your child is doing at school and how you can help your child best at home. Try to meet with the teacher as much as necessary. Working as a team, this partnership can make the school year go more smoothly for you and your child.

READ, READ, READ: Develop an Early Reader

Want to spend time with your child, build their reading skills, and help them to love books? You can do all three when you read aloud. Here are suggestions:

- ⇒ Read Regularly: Try to read to or with your child every day. You might aim for 10-15 minutes of bedtime reading. Bring along a book, and read to them during a sibling's sports practice. Curl up together with a book when you get home from work.
- ⇒ Take Turns Choosing Books: Your child may want to hear old favorites again and again. Use your turn for new titles and variety (nonfiction, poetry, etc.).
- ⇒ Let Them Participate: Ask your child to turn the pages while you read. Also, they can finish sentences that rhyme or fill in words they know. Go slowly so they have time to understand the story and look at the illustrations. They'll enjoy read-aloud time more if they play an active role.



⇒ Be Playful: You can use different voices for different characters (a high, squeaky voice for a mouse or a deep, booming voice for a horse). Or substitute your child's name for the main character's name, and use family members' names for other characters.

Remember, you don't have to be an expert reader...your child will love it when you read to or with them because it's you:).






