Families and Community members,
Another school year is in the books! I am so proud of the Coldwater student body and school staff for a fantastic year and for staying focused on school work, building relationships, and enhancing a phenomenal culture within our school community. There will always be distractions that disrupt or derail our primary purpose in schools, but in Coldwater, our students and staff block out those distractions and continue to excel. Now that we have begun the official start of summer for a large majority of our staff and all of our students, I hope everyone can rest, recharge, and enjoy family, friends, and all the summer activities within our wonderful community
 and elsewhere.

Our previous communication outlined how we will move forward for our next academic school year. The Board of Education will continue to engage the community on a potential levy for the November 2024 election. The board will hold another community forum this time in the Pit on June 19, 2024, at 6 pm . In addition, our board meetings are regularly scheduled for June 25th, July 16th, August 13th, and October 8th. Each meeting is open to the public, where we go over every detail regarding our expenses, including all expenditures for that month. There have been some questions circulating in our community regarding our expenditures and how they compare to local school districts. Below is a chart comparing per-pupil expenditures for area school districts. Each category is ranked 1 as the highest and 13 as the lowest.

1. Coldwater has the lowest administrative expenditure per pupil, ranked 13 th out of 13 .
2. Coldwater is ranked 6th out of 13 in instructional expenditures. It is essential to point out that Coldwater has a very experienced staff, with an average experience of 20.8 years.
3. Coldwater is ranked 10th out of 13 in other costs per pupil.
4. Coldwater is ranked 10 th out of 13 in total operating expenditure per pupil.
5. Coldwater is ranked 4th out of 13 in enrollment.

We continue to be very frugal in everything we do to maintain a stable 5-year forecast. Our maintenance crew recently went to Celina to pull out 80 student desks from a dumpster since Celina moved out of their building to a new building with new furniture. Another area we have been frugal is the carpet in the middle school is so worn that our custodians iron the carpet to try to get it to re-adhere to the floor so that the wrinkles are not apparent or a trip hazard. These examples of our frugality will not compensate for our unfunded priorities with our decaying infrastructure, out-of-lifecycle technology, aging district-owned musical instruments, and other inadequate instructional materials. As mentioned, our Board of Education will have another Community Forum on June 19, 2024, at 6 PM in the Pit. At the forum, they will discuss some of the unfunded priorities that we are worried about and not currently in our budget or 5-year forecast. In addition, the board will discuss what the levy may look like for the election in November. Our goal as a district is to have the capacity and the funds to handle some of the essential priorities for our facilities, equipment, and materials that are up to Coldwater standards.

Planning for next year started this past December and will be fine-tuned over the summer months. We are also preparing for future years. The Board of Education approved school calendars for the 2025-2026 and 2026-2027 school years. I have linked the PDF versions of these calendars and next year's calendar for your convenience. I have also linked the text versions of these calendars so that you can import the dates into your calendar.

## Financial Update

The Board of Education approved the May updated Five-Year Forecast that I presented during the May $14^{\text {th }}$ board meeting. This forecast is prepared based upon historical trends and current factors. This information is then extrapolated into estimates for subsequent years. The forecast variables can change multiple times throughout the fiscal year and while cash flow monitoring
 helps to identify unexpected variances no process is guaranteed. The intent is to provide the district's financial trend over time and a roadmap for decisions aimed at encouraging financial sustainability and stability. I also would highly encourage everyone to read this article from Howard Fleeter. Howard has a PhD in Economics and has extensive experience working with policymakers and stakeholders on issues of education and human services finance, tax reform, state budgeting and economic impact analysis. This article speaks to how property taxes and reappraisals work for schools in Ohio compared to the rest of the country. He quotes "HB 920 is the most restrictive property tax limitation in the country because Ohio alone allows no inflationary growth in property tax revenues from voted levies. It also is the primary reason that Ohio relies on local levies more than any other state."

## Coldwater Elementary Summer Reading/Math Incentive 2024

This summer the team at Coldwater Elementary will again have a summer reading/math incentive program for our Little Cavaliers to encourage and motivate students to read, study math facts, and work on other skills throughout the summer. Each student was given a packet of information by their homeroom teacher to take home at the end of the year about this program that explains the goal, various ways of accomplishing the goal, and the incentive/reward. If you cannot locate this packet, you can pick one up in the elementary office, check the Coldwater Elementary website for the links, or the Coldwater Elementary Facebook page. Incentive requirements are explained below as well. Students who complete the incentive will get to have either a play day at the park for 2024-25 first and second grade students or a swimming day at the pool for 2024-25 third and fourth grade students with the date TBD. You will also have the opportunity to purchase Kona Ice on this day! Please encourage your children to read and practice other skills this summer to be prepared for the 2024-25 school year.

## Students who are going into 1st and 2nd grades:

You will need to read a minimum of 400 minutes (1st Grade) or 500 minutes (2nd Grade) throughout the summer. You will also need to practice your addition and subtraction facts a minimum of 40 times for five minutes each time. Here are some ways that you can achieve this.

1. Go to the Public Library and participate in their summer reading program. You do not have to have all 400 or 500 minutes by the end of the library reading program. You can use the library reading program to help you towards the goal of reading minutes.

## 2. *Parents, you may read to your child if necessary and count those minutes toward the goal.

3. If you ordered the Summer Bridge book offered from the PTO you can count that time towards your minutes AND you would need to return it to your teacher the first day of school. If you work on math related skills count that as part of your math time, and if you are doing reading related skills count that towards your reading time. (If you did not order one and want to, you can do so on Amazon.com)
4. If your teacher sends home a summer work packet, you may also count that time towards your goal. If you are working on math skills for ten minutes then that can count as well. Also if you are working on some reading skills then those minutes can count towards that also.
5. You can log onto xtramath.org and practice math facts. You can also just use your addition and subtraction flashcards. Whichever you choose to do, practice them for five minutes at a time and this must be done 40 times throughout the summer.

## Students who are going into 3rd or 4th grades:

You will need to read a minimum of 700 minutes throughout the summer. You will also need to practice your addition/subtraction facts (if needed) and your multiplication/division facts a minimum of 40 times for five minutes each time. Here are some ways that you can achieve this.

1. Go to the Public Library and participate in their summer reading program. You do not have to have all 700 minutes by the end of the library reading program. You can use the library reading program to help you towards the goal of 700 reading minutes.
2. If you ordered the Summer Bridge book offered from the PTO you can count that time towards your minutes AND you would need to return it to your teacher the first day of school. If you work on math related skills count that as part of your math time, and if you are doing reading related skills count that towards your reading time. (If you did not order one and want to, you can do so on Amazon.com)
3. If your teacher sends home a summer work packet, you may also count that time towards your goal. If you are working on math skills for ten minutes then that can count as well. Also if you are working on some reading skills then those minutes can count towards that also.
4. You can log onto xtramath.org and practice math facts. You can also just use your addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division flashcards. Whichever method you choose to do, practice them for five minutes at a time and this must be done 40 times throughout the summer

## **If you have a child who is being tutored this summer, please feel free to use that time also. Whatever time they are spending on reading, count those minutes for the reading time and whatever time spent on math counts as math time.

**Also available to parents is the Title Support Reading Google Classroom. This site offers many resources for parents to use with their child that can count towards the academic incentive minutes. To join the classroom, you must go to Google Classroom, then click the + in the upper right corner, then click "Join class". You will then enter the class code into the box. The code is: gdor6fc.

In order for your child to earn the reward, he/she must return the recording form on either the first or second day of the 2024$\mathbf{2 5}$ school year. The turn in due dates are as follows: Tuesday, August 20th or Wednesday, August 21, 2024. All forms must be signed by a parent and turned in on one of these two days.

You may go to the links on our Coldwater Elementary Website or Coldwater Elementary Facebook Page and record your child's minutes read (using the Reading Incentive link):

If you do this, you do not have to turn in the recording form at the beginning of the year. Each time you click on the link you can enter information for your child and the system will record it. You may enter information at one time for the entire summer or enter information throughout the summer.

## Summer Tips for "Little Cav" READING Success

Efforts should be made during the summer to help children sustain reading skills, practice reading and read for enjoyment. Parents should remember that children need free time in the summer to relax and enjoy the pleasures of childhood. So summer reading should be fun. Following are a few tips to make reading enjoyable for your children this summer:

1. Read aloud together with your child every day.

Make it fun by reading outdoors on the front steps, patio, at the beach or park. Also, let your children read to you. For younger children, point out the relationship between words and sounds.
2. Set a good example!

Parents must be willing to model behavior for their children. Keep lots of reading material around the house. Turn off the TV and have each person read his or her book, including mom and dad.
3. Read the same book your child is reading and discuss it.

This is the way to develop habits of the mind and build capacity for thought and insight.
4. Let kids choose what they want to read, and don't turn your nose up at popular fiction.

It will only discourage the reading habit.
5. Buy books on tape, especially for a child with a learning disability.

Listen to them in the car, or turn off the TV and have the family listen to them together.
6. Take your children to the library regularly.

Most libraries sponsor summer reading clubs with easy-to-reach goals for preschool and school-age children. Check the library calendar for special summer reading activities and events. Libraries also provide age appropriate lists for summer reading.
7. Subscribe, in your child's name, to magazines like Sports Illustrated for Kids, Highlights for Children, or National Geographic World.
Encourage older children to read the newspaper and current events magazines, to keep up the reading habit over the summer and develop vocabulary. Ask them what they think about what they've read, and listen to what they say.
8. Ease disappointment over summer separation from a favorite school friend by encouraging them to become pen pals.

Present both children with postcards or envelopes that are already addressed and stamped. If both children have access to the Internet, email is another option.
9. Make trips a way to encourage reading by reading aloud traffic signs, billboards, notices.

Show your children how to read a map, and once you are on the road, let them take turns being the navigator.
10. Encourage children to keep a summer scrapbook.

Tape in souvenirs of your family's summer activities picture postcards, ticket stubs, photos. Have your children write the captions and read them and read them aloud as you look at the book together.

## Creative Summer Learning Ideas (from scholastic.com)

There's no getting around it: Over the summer months, our students can lose up to $60 \%$ of the math and reading skills that they learned during the year. Here are dozens of ideas to keep them learning and dozens of fun activities to share with parents.

## Summer Math Activities

Help students maintain their math skills and keep them thinking in numbers all summer long.

## For Grades K-3:

Shopaholic: What can you buy for $\$ 5$ at the corner store? From the ice cream truck? In a hardware store? At the beach?

Change it up: Start collecting change in a jar on the first day of summer. On the last day, estimate your change, count it, and plan a special purchase.

Summer patterns: Create patterns using summer items (popsicle sticks, shells, flowers). Or, draw patterns in the sand or dirt using a stick or your hands. See how long you can carry out your pattern - along the length of the sandbox, or across the grass.

Napkin fractions: Fold paper towels or napkins into large and small fractions, from one-half to $1 / 16$. Use markers to label and decorate the different fractions.

Design hunt: Keep an eye out for shapes, patterns, and designs when you're out and about. You never know what you'll find in the architecture at the airport, the shopping mall, or even the grocery store.
$\mathbf{1 0 0 \%}$ delicious: Use ice cream to make fraction sundaes. Can you make an ice cream sundae that is one-half vanilla and one-half chocolate? What about one-third chocolate, one-third vanilla, and one-third strawberry? Can you cover a scoop of ice cream with one-quarter each of nuts, sprinkles, cookie crumbs, and gummy bears? Or can you eat a bite of ice cream that is one-half chocolate, one-half vanilla? For older children, calculate the percentage of each ice cream flavor in the sundae.

## For Grades 4-8:

Record-breakers: Use a stopwatch to time yourself running, roller blading, swimming, or biking. Then try to beat your time. Be sure to keep the distance you're moving the same for each trial. Graph the results. (You may need a partner for this.)

Where will you be? Using a map, calculate where you will be if you travel $20,50,100$, or 1,000 miles from home.
How many ways? As you're exploring your neighborhood during the summer, how many routes can you take to the school, the grocery store, the mall, or your friend's house? The catch: No backtracking, and you must take a new route each time.

Let's eat: Prepare a meal or dish for the family. Before you go to the supermarket, find a recipe, write what you need and how much. At the supermarket, choose the best-priced option.

## Summer Reading Activities

These ideas will keep kids engaged in reading, writing, and thinking creatively even on the hottest days.

Water writer: Using a pail of water and a brush, have kids write words on the blacktop or sidewalk.
Sell summer: Tell kids: Try a new product or activity and write about it. How would you describe it? Would you recommend it? Create an advertisement to sell it to others.

Plan a trip: Have kids use the Internet, travel guidebooks, brochures, and maps to plan a dream day, weekend, week, or month-long trip.

Summer sleuth: Have kids follow a story in a newspaper during the summer, or investigate a local story (e.g., an upcoming fair). Tell kids: Write about the event as it unfolds so that you have it documented from start to finish.

Play it: Take an adventure book with a clear plot (The Phantom Tollbooth, Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, etc.) and invent a board game based on it.

Comic strip: Write a comic strip about a fictional character or yourself. See how long you can keep the strip going. Read classic comics for inspiration.

## Summer Science Fun

Summer is the perfect time for children to explore their extracurricular interests, like science. Here are some activities that will have children hypothesizing all the way to September.

Map the weather: Keep a running log of the weather. Include temperature, humidity, clouds, precipitation, wind, air pressure. Can you predict what the weather will be tomorrow?

Invent a recipe for a summer drink and share it with your friends. For example,
 the Citrus Sizzler: $1 / 2$ cup Sprite, $1 / 2$ cup pineapple juice, 1 spritz lime juice.

Museum gallery: Collect pinecones, rocks, shells, or other natural objects to organize, categorize, and label. Present your own natural history museum.

Hot-weather inventor: Design an invention that you can use during summer. Some ideas: sunglasses that change color from red to yellow to blue, or a new beach toy.

Answer a question: How long does it take an ice cube to melt outside in the summer heat? In the refrigerator? In an air conditioned room?

Float or sink: In a pool or the bathtub, hypothesize which items (soap, dry sock, bottle of shampoo, rock, etc.) will float or sink. Test your hypotheses.

## Keeping Kids Motivated

Parent involvement during the summer months is crucial to student success. According to the National Education Association, "Parents who are actively involved in their children's learning at home help their children become more successful learners in and out of school." Encourage parents with a final newsletter full of activities that will stave off forgetfulness and even build skills over the summer.

Set aside time each day to read. Track the books your child reads and reward him or her with a special activity or treat when he or she reaches certain milestones (for example, every 10th book). Do art projects based on favorite titles, such as drawing a favorite scene, or making paper bag puppets

Visit your local library. Many libraries have wonderful summer reading programs that reward children for the number of books they read.

Make every day educational. Children learn problem-solving, math, science, and vocabulary as they help with groceries, laundry, and cooking.

Create a summer scrapbook. Save postcards and movie tickets, record family stories or interesting events from each day, whether you're going on vacation or just going to your neighborhood park.

## Roadworthy Car Games

For kids on the bus or families on vacation, put those long rides to good use with activities that keep the kids busy and build reading and math skills.

## For grades $\mathrm{K}-3$ :

Car bingo: Create a car bingo card with words, shapes, colors, and items that children will likely see during a trip (stop signs, billboards, railroad signs, etc.)
 to reinforce reading skills, math, and sight words.

The number game: Look out the window and call out when you see one, two, three, or four of something, and so on.
The alphabet game: One person chooses the right side of the road, and the other chooses the left. Call out objects that you see in alphabetical order (you can use a sign only for one letter). The first person to get to the letter "z" wins.

For grades 4-8:
Capital game: Take note of each license plate you see, not by state, but by state capital. The first to correctly identify 10 state capitals wins.

Cow game: One person takes the right side of the road, the other takes the left. Keep count of all the cows you see. You earn one point for each cow. When you see a cemetery out of your side of the car, you lose all your points.

Animals galore: Decide on a number of points for each animal that you see (cow = 1 point, horse $=1$ point, pig = 2 points, etc.). As you drive, add up the points. Play until one person gets 10 points, or for a set time.

Math with license plates: Use the numbers on license plates to practice addition, subtraction, multiplication, and number patterns and see just how creative kids can get!
