

Please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher with a concern or advice on academic/behavioral/social/emotional strategies and interventions. The Coldwater Elementary Team together with parents want to do what is best for kids and for your child. It is very hard to achieve success alone, but when a team is involved, educators and parents, success can be achieved. Our team looks forward to a continued amazing school year doing things "The Cavalier Way"!

Arrival/Dismissal Reminders

These reminders/expectations are set up to keep all students and adults safe. Please follow these expectations:

- All Coldwater community members who are driving near the school during arrival (7:45-8:20 a.m.) and dismissal (2:55-3:20 p.m.) times, please drive slowly, carefully and be mindful of pedestrians traveling across crosswalks. This is a school zone and the speed limit is 20 m.p.h.
- * Adults and students, please use the CROSSWALKS when crossing Vine Street especially during arrival and dismissal times. Little eyes are watching what you do. Please set great examples for them.

<u>ARRIVAL</u>

If your child is not a bus rider, we are asking them to enter at the assigned doors:

- 3rd & 4th Grade Students: Circle Drive Door #13 (Pit)
- Kindergarten & 2nd Grade: Elementary Playground Door #11
- 1st Grade: Circle Drive Door #12 (Elevator)

*Signs have been placed on each door to clearly mark these entrances.

- If you are parking your car to walk your child across Vine St. in the morning, please ONLY park in the Visitor's Parking Lot. DO NOT park in the numbered spaces as those have been reserved for Coldwater Elementary Staff. (Staff arrive at various times throughout the morning.)
- * Please remember that parents ARE NOT allowed to walk their child(ren) to the classroom without permission. If you need something from the office, please stop at the office window.

Again, our goal is to get all of our students into the elementary school in the safest way possible.

DISMISSAL (Car Rider) REMINDERS

- If you want to park and walk across Vine St. to pick up your child, you may do so. We ask that you park in an actual open parking spot or in the Visitor's Parking Lot.
- If you do park in the lot, we ask that you walk across at the crosswalk to pick up your child. Please do not tell your child to walk over to your car in the parking lot on their own. This is not safe.
- When driving through the elementary parking lot...SLOW DOWN and PAY ATTENTION. When exiting the lot, please do not turn right. You may only turn left as we have many students walking to the CPAC and track/football field.
- If you are waiting for an elementary or middle school student in the car rider line or get out to help your child get in or buckle up, please pull up in front of the red cone so others waiting to pick up their child(ren) can continue to move through the line.
- Together, we all have the collective responsibility to keep all of our children safe during dismissal time.

We want to continue to have an awesome and safe school year! Please help us accomplish this goal!

Children today are faced with many opportunities and challenges as they enter a fast-changing world and we want to do everything we can to encourage and empower their success. 






Upcoming Scholastic Book Fair

After-School Questions

Asking "How was school today?" might not get you far if you want to know in greater detail how your child's day at school went. Instead ask questions like these for a better picture of your Little Cav's day:

- \Rightarrow Pretend you're the teacher. How would you describe the day?
- \Rightarrow What made you laugh today?
- \Rightarrow What was the most creative thing you did?
- \Rightarrow How were you kind or helpful today? Was anyone kind or helpful to you?
- \Rightarrow Describe a book you enjoyed today.
- \Rightarrow Tell me what you learned that you'd like to know more about.
- \Rightarrow Let's see what you worked on today?
- \Rightarrow Show me what you have for homework?
- \Rightarrow Tell me what you learned that you would like to know more about?

CAVALIER "Ready to Learn" TIPS

(U.S. Department of Education: Reading Tips for Parents)

"The Five Essential Components of Reading"



Reading with children and helping them practice specific reading components can dramatically improve their ability to read. Scientific research shows that there are five essential components of reading that children must be taught in order to learn to read. Adults can help children learn to be good readers by systematically practicing these five components:

Recognizing and using individual sounds to create words, or phonemic awareness. Children need to be taught to hear sounds in words and that words are made up of the smallest parts of sound, or phonemes.

Inderstanding the relationships between written letters and spoken sounds, or phonics. Children need to be taught the sounds individual printed letters and groups of letters make. Knowing the relationships between letters and sounds helps children to recognize familiar words accurately and automatically, and "decode" new words.

Developing the ability to read a text accurately and quickly, or reading fluency. Children must learn to read words rapidly and accurately in order to understand what is read. When fluent readers read silently, they recognize words automatically. When fluent readers read aloud, they read effortlessly and with expression. Readers who are weak in fluency read slowly, word by word, focusing on decoding words instead of comprehending meaning.

I Learning the meaning and pronunciation of words, or vocabulary development. Children need to actively build and expand their knowledge of written and spoken words, what they mean and how they are used.

Acquiring strategies to understand, remember and communicate what is read, or reading comprehension strategies. Children need to be taught comprehension strategies, or the steps good readers use to make sure they understand text. Students who are in control of their own reading comprehension become purposeful, active readers.

"Simple Strategies for Creating Strong Readers"

- Invite your child to read to or with you every day.
- When reading a book where the print is large, point word by word as you read. This will help the child learn that reading goes from left to right and understand that the word he or she says is the word he or she sees.
- Read a child's favorite book over and over again.
- Read many stories with rhyming words and lines that repeat. Invite the child to join in on these parts. Point, word by word, as he or she reads along with you.
- Discuss new words. For example, "This big house is called a palace. Who do you think lives in a palace?"
- Stop and ask about the pictures and about what is happening in the story.
- Read from a variety of children's books, including fairy tales, song books, poems, and information books.

CAVALIER "Wonderful Wordplay"

(From: "Reading Connection: Beginning Edition")

Use these activities to build your child's phonemic awareness - which is the ability to hear sounds in words. Phonemic Awareness is an important literacy skill that creates fluent readers.

- Choose a three-letter word, such as *cap*. Have your child substitute different beginning sounds from the alphabet to make new words (*lap, map, nap, rap, sap, tap, zap*). How many words can they think of?
- Pick a long word and tell your child to clap once as they say each syllable. For *mozzarella*, they would clap four times: *moz-za-rel-la*
- Ask your child to say a word without the first sound. Example: "Can you say sit without the s? (Answer: it)
- Think of a word, and give your child a "sound" clue to figure it out. For instance, "I'm thinking of a word for something that you chew but don't swallow. The word has an *uh* sound in the middle."

(Answer: Gum)
















Cavalier Community,

OMEA ALL-STATE CHILDREN'S CHORUS








Farm Science Review
